#### WHO IS JESUS?

He had no degree – yet, they called Him Teacher


He had no medicines – yet, they called Him Healer

He committed no crime – yet, they crucified Him


He was buried in a tomb – YET HE LIVES TODAY!



For scourging, the man was stripped of his clothing and his hands were tied to an upright post. The scourging was by two soldiers and was intended to weaken the victim to a state just short of death.

As soldiers repeatedly struck the victim with full force, the iron balls and rocks would cause deep contusions and the leather thongs and sheep bones would cut into the skin.

Then as the flogging continued, the lacerations would tear into underlying muscles and produce quivering ribbons of bleeding flesh. Pain and blood loss generally set the stage for shock.




THE FEET

Most commonly, the feet were fixed to the front of the cross by means of an iron spike driven through them. It was likely that the deep peronel nerve and branches of the medial and lateral nerves would have been injured by the nails.

To breath out required lifting the body by pushing up on the feet and by flexing the elbows and shoulders. However, this

maneuver would place the entire weight of the body on the tarsals and would produce searing pain.




This is a drawing from a youth that was at my church before LBC that he gave to me. Needless to say, it is priceless to me. He is now an adult with wife and children.

The major effect of crucifixion beyond the excruciating pain was a marked interference with normal breathing, particularly exhalation.

The weight of the body pulling down on the outstretched arms and shoulders would make the breathing painful and shallow.

The onset of muscle cramps and contractions due to fatigue would hinder breathing even more. Also in lifting the body to breath would painfully scrape the scourged back against the rough wood. Muscle cramps and a burning feeling would add to the pain.

It was customary for the condemned man to carry his own cross from the flogging post to the site of crucifixion. Since the weight of the entire cross was well over 300 pounds, only the



cross bar was carried. The cross bar usually weighed between 75 to 125 pounds.

At the site of the execution, by law, the victim was given a bitter drink of wine mixed with myrrh (gall) as a mild analgesic.

Not uncommon, the insects would light upon or burrow into the open wounds or the eyes, ears, and nose of the dying victim. Birds of prey would also tear at these sites. Moreover it was customary to leave the corpse on the cross to be devoured by predatory animals.


However, the family could take the body for burial after obtaining permission from the Roman judge.

# THE FOLDED LINEN

John 20:3-7 - Peter therefore went forth, and that other disciple, and came to the sepulchre. So they ran both together: and the other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to the sepulchre. And he stooping down, and looking in, saw the linen clothes lying; yet went he not in. Then cometh Simon Peter following him, and went into the sepulchre, and seeth the linen clothes lie, And the napkin, that was about his head, not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together in a place by itself.

In order to understand the significance of the folded napkin, you have to understand a little bit about Hebrew tradition of that day ... The folded napkin had to do with the Master and the Servant, and every Jewish boy knew this tradition. When the servant set the dinner table for the master, he made sure that it was exactly the way the master wanted it. Then the servant would wait just out of sight until the master had finished eating, and the servant would not dare touch the table until the master was finished. Now, if the master was done eating, he would rise up from the table, wipe his his fingers, his mouth, and clean his beard, and would wad up the napkin and toss it onto the table. The servant would then know to clear the table. For in those days, the wadded napkin meant, I'm done." But if the master got up from the table and folded his napkin, and laid it beside his

plate, the servant would not dare touch the table, because the folded napkin meant, HE'S COMING BACK!"



#### THE HANDS

The wrists were nailed to the crossbar. The ligaments and bones of the wrists can support the weight of the body hanging from them, but the palms cannot.

The likelihood of painful injury would be great. The driven nail would likely crush or sever the large median nerve and stimulate the nerve to produce excruciating bolts of fiery pain in both arms. It would also result in paralysis of a portion of the hand.
